### INTRODUCATION

The report contains the activities undertaken by the staff of the Department of Social Welfare and Community Development between January and December, 2022.

However, 6 study groups, 20 women's groups were visited. 25 mass meetings were held in 20 communities. Monitoring of village savings and loans Association (VSLA) women's groups/gender main streaming into CLTS. Disbursement of 3% common fund to people with disability, payment of cash grants to beneficiaries, LEAP case management, training of PWDs in soap making, case management support to persons with disability, community sensitization on child rights and protection, sensitization of community on establishment of community child protection team (CCPTs), monitoring of mother to mother care groups; Educational campaIng on HIV/Aids child care, teenage pregnancy, hand washing with soap, tree planting, bush burning, malaria, water/environmental sanitation, child marriage, climate change, drug abuse were intensified.

### PROGRAMME EXECUTED

### CHILD RIGHTS PROTECTION AND PROMOTION

### **CASE MANAGEMENT**

During the year the department handled 10 cases. The cases recorded were in the area of child custody 6, general advice 4. All the cases recorded were resolved and disposed off within the year with the help of family members of both couples. However mothers of the children reported the fathers of the children for neglecting the responsibility in the up keep of the children.

Also within the period of the year a number of LEAP cases were managed in the District which included cases of deceased care givers, expired cards, damaged cards, as well as addition of secondary care givers, these cases were monitored in 15 LEAP implementing communities.

Expired cards belonging to Stanbic Bank Ghana could not be renew because of some technical upgrade being undertaken by the banks. As a result of this all households who has challenges with Stanbic Bank e-zwich cards could not have their cards replaced. Two day care centers were also visited during the year under review.

### MASS MEETING

Information under this programmed during the year reveals that 25 mass meeting were held in 20 communities covering about 1730 people made up of 830 males and 900 females

### COMMUNITY SENSITIZATION

During the review of the year a number of sensitization were undertaken across the district in some communities;

- In collaboration with environmental health and sanitation unit a sensitization meetings were held on disposal of human excreta, house hold water treatment and storage, steps in ODF attainment, the need for every house to have a household toilet.
- The department also organized meetings with communities on establishment of community child protection team (CCPT), sensitization on child rights and protection especially on children with disability the right of children with disability to life, education, and other basic needs in society.

### **COMMUNITY CARE**

### SUPPORT TO PERSONS WITH DISABILITY

During the year under review the District Assembly made available of an amount of Eighty-eight Thousand Six hundred and Fifty six Ghana Cedis (GHC88,656.00) for the disabled in the district for disbursement to assist persons with disabilities (PWDs). The fund was distributed to one hundred and forty six (146) selected PWDs in the district for the purpose of apprenticeship training, payment of school fees, hospital bills, farming, petty trading and grain baking.

The table below shows the various forms of disability and the number of persons who benefited with those form of disability.

### LIVELIHOOD EMPOWERMENT AGAINST POVERTY (LEAP) PAYMENT OF FUNDS TO BENEFICIARY HOUSEHOLDS

During the review of the year funds for payment of 75<sup>th</sup>, 76<sup>th</sup>, 77<sup>th</sup>, 78<sup>th</sup>, 79<sup>th</sup> and 80<sup>th</sup> LEAP cycle payment was made to 18,464 beneficiary households across the district. Payment was done by Bonzali rural bank and Salaga farmers' cooperative credit union.

In all an amount of GHC 1028960.00 WAS PAID TO 18,464 beneficiary households across 102 communities in the district. Out of that, 5885 households were able to cash out their funds without any challenges. With the remaining 157 not being able to cash out as a result of the challenges mentioned below.

- Finger print scan failure
- Decedaed care givers
- Relocation of house hold care giver
- Absence of care giver
- No funds on some beneficiary cards

Measures are however being kept in place to ensure those challenges are resolved for the household to receive their cash grants. Monitoring of payment was done in all LEAP communities.

### TRAINING OF PWDS

Within the period of the year a training was conducted for 100 women PWDs in soap and beads making in wapuli and Gbangbanpong zone of the Saboba District. The training was aimed at equipping female group amongst PWDs in the District with a hand skill to make them economically empowered in their household.

During the opening of the training the District chief executive, Hon. Gearge Bingrini encourage beneficiaries to take it seriously so as to enable them become economically sustained. He mentioned that this would help them to be able to also make meaningful contribution to their households. He further assured the persons with disability in the area that the assembly would respond to their call whenever the need arose.

### **HOME SCIENCE EXTENSION**

During the year the staff of the Department monitored and supervised mother to mother cae groups under world Food programme (WFP) in two (2) communities namely, Gbangbanpong and Yankazia in order to check on rebagging of iodated salt and fortification progress. It was observed that market is down due to shortage of rubber and break down of sealer.

Also monitored and supervised by the department village savings and loans Association (VSLA) women's groups under resiliency in northern Ghana (RING) programme across the district.

Most of the groups engaged themselves with the following activities, such as groundnuts processing, rice processing, sheabutter processing, soap making, food selling and petting trading.

Number of village covered – 12

Number of group membership – 435

### **IMPACT**

- Improved capital investment
- Improved income level of the people
- Improved standard of living of the people
- Could now pay their wards school fees and up keep of the family.

### **CONSTRAINTS**

- Expansion of water system
- In adequate/lack of portable drinking water
- People walk long distance to access water from water points.
- Some communities need to be connected to the national grid (electricity).
- Poor harvest due to inadequate/lack of farming equipment for timely ploughing.
- Violation of group constitution by some group members.
- Women demanding support to do petty trading.

- High level of unemployment and under employment among the youth. High incidence of poverty.

### EXTENSION SERVICE (COLLABORATION WITH OTHER DEVELOPMENT PARTNERS)

During the year under review the Department in collaboration with environmental health and sanitation unit organized community meeting across the district on safe disposal of human excreta, household water treatment and storage, steps in ODF attainment, the need for every house to have a household toilet.

### **CHALLENGES**

The challenges are numerous however the pressing ones are inadequate means of transport for field work to go on, inadequate quarterly impress (funds), Computer, Cabinet, to undertake Departmental programmes in the district.

### WAY FORWARD

The district assembly should do all it could to help the department with means of transport, computer, cabinet and quarterly funds should also be made available by the District assembly for the smooth running of the departmental programmes in the district.

### CONCLUSION

The activities were undertaken in collaboration with the District Assembly and Development Partners.
